WHO WE ARE

Dhagagia Social Welfare Society (DSWS) was established in 1994. This organization was registered under West Bengal Society Registration Act XXVI of 1961 and registered under Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act, 1976, u/s. 12AA and 80G Act of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and also registered under the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, Govt. of India.

Woman & Child Protection

We protect women and children from abuse, neglect, exploitation and violence in our working areas. Our programs focus on the most vulnerable women and children while aiming for the safety and well-being of all women and children.

We believe every child deserves a future and we give children a healthy start in life, the opportunity to learn and protection from harm. We protect children from abuse, neglect, exploitation, and violence in our working area. Community based protection mechanisms will be in place to stop trafficking of children for domestic work, marriage, abuse or other hazardous occupations and make child domestic work socially and culturally unacceptable through practical means (models of best practices) by which child domestic work can be successfully reduced and gradually abolished in the high endemic districts of West Bengal, India.

Achievements of Child protection program at Sandeshkhali Block-I & II (2021-2022):

- 80 functional Children Groups formalized with an active membership of 1738 children (1606 Girls & 132 Boys).
- All Children group members are good fighter against trafficking and gender-based violence.
- 80 functional Child Protection Committees with an active membership of 1598 children (812 Women & 796 Men).
- All Child Protection Committee members are good fighter against trafficking and gender-based violence. Government authorities are using them as a resource person in the program of gender discrimination and child protection. Demonstrated model Child protection mechanism in the District that is being recognised by Government at State and District.
- Total 56 child marriage prevented.
- Total 107 dropout children got admission in school (through direct intervention)
- 152 Children received SC/ST Certificate
- 665 children got coaching support.

KEY CHALLENGES ON THE PROGRAMME:

We have faced some challenges for better implementation of the programme like COVID-19, lack of communication and religious problems for community participation.

"Protection of Children from Trafficking Through Responsive Community Action"

ABOUT THE PROJECT: The prime reason for trafficking of large number of children from Districts of North 24 Parganas is social and cultural sanction to child labour and marriage, discrimination against the girl child, absence of protection mechanism for children, infirmities of response of the different departments of the govt. specially police. There is also problem of gap between police and the community, underreporting of trafficking & marriage cases, rescue and rehabilitation of victims, post rescue care and reintegration efforts.

In this critical context, **DSWS** has therefore decided to implement a project (Supported by **Hummingbird Foundation**) in Hingalganj Gram Panchayat under Hingalganj Block of North 24 Parganas and the Gram Panchayat is situated at the Indo Bangladesh border for the prevention of Child (Girls) trafficking.

THREE PILARS OF THE PROJECT

- Collectivisation
- → VLCPCs.
- **→** Entitlement

Strategies: We have taken some strategies to implement this project: Identify, pilot and promote innovative approaches to reach Collectives and promote their role as agents of change in their communities. Strengthening capacity of partners (including government duty bearers and civil society) through training in order to address adolescents' rights and needs for holistic services. Scaling up interventions with and for collectives through their overall empowerment through collectivisation module and in partnership with GOWB and other civil society organizations. Creating convergence across state line departments and allied departments.

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Achievements at Hingalgunj

- Collectives have taken in 60 cases. They admitted 21 drop out students and stopped thirty-nine child marriages
- 8 action programmes has been undertaken by each collective.
- 19 cases showing VLCPC's support collectives without from collectives.
- 14 (100%) VLCPCs formed and strengthened as per govt. guideline.
- 14 VLCPC prepared a standard Plan (as per the guideline) for upcoming two years VLCPC implements.
- 15% vulnerable families receive Govt. entitlements. 56% vulnerable families are aware 6 identified Govt. schemes.

One Coordinator, one counselor, six team member and one volunteer. Being a partner of a 24 hour national free emergency phone outreach service like Childline, members of Childline team of Dhagagia Social welfare society works not only providing emergency support to children in need of care and protection on a 24*7 basis but also their had some other functioning like outreach and awareness generating programme regarding Child rights, Childline and its activity.

Babughat Childline Project (2021-2022):

Dhagagia Social welfare society works as NGO partner with Childline Indian Foundation for Kolkata Babughat Bus Stand. It works as Collaborating organization in this district. It directly looks after Babughat Bus Stand area. Presently there are all total twelve members working in this Childline project. One Coordinator, one counselor, seven team member and three volunteer. Being a partner of a 24 hour national free emergency phone outreach service like Childline, members of Childline team of Dhagagia Social welfare society works not only providing emergency support to children in need of care and protection on a 24*7 basis but also their had some other functioning like outreach and awareness generating programme regarding Child rights, Childline and its activity. Babughat Childline team trying to generates awareness to Bus Stand area by this outreach and awareness, generating programme.







Child Health:

We are trying to improve health seeking behaviour and practices on Infant, Young Child, and Maternal Nutrition among local marginalized communities who are severely impacted due to changes in the environment and climatic condition in the region and the decaying local economy and to strengthen the capacities of communities and other duty bearers to prevent and respond to environmental health issues in Sundarban area.

We formed 52 adolescence groups and 52 mothers groups for community based health vigilance groups which groups are monitoring regularly in community level and Government institutions in health and hygiene aspects. Adolescence groups and Mothers group conducted meetings in the target areas to discuss on issues related to health, nutrition. These groups are trying to strengthening referral mechanism of cases of danger signs regarding maternal and child health care to First Referral Units (FRUs) and malnourished children to Nutrition Rehabilitation Centre (NRC). They tried to linkage with provision for sanitary toilets at household level.



EDUCATION PROGRAM:

DSWS based in Sundarban, envisions to ensure quality education for all children from under resourced and at risk sections of society. Through its various action research initiatives in pedagogy, curriculum development, teacher development program, children supplementary learning centers and child protection, DSWS has spread its work not only in West Bengal but also in Jharkhand.

Due to lockdown and loss of livelihood, wages and income among most of the parents, children are either forced to child labour or they are willing engaging themselves to some work heading towards high chances of school drop outs. Therefore, reintegration of these children were done followed by re-enrolment.

- a. Liaison with school teachers andwe were developed plan for enrolling children
- b. Out of school children identified through the survey was linked with formal schools
- c. DSWS volunteers were identified children lacking interest in schools and re integrate them in schools after proper family counselling and required steps, particularly in post-COVID situation. Continuous tracking and home visit of irregular children to be done to make them regular.
- d. DSWS volunteers were conducted 36 sensitization program on RtE Act, gender equality, Child rights in 18 schools of Sundarban.
- e. DSWS volunteers were conducted 20 sensitization program on Girls education in 20 schools of Sundarban area.
- f. 223 children were mainstreamed through DSWS team members.
- g. We gave educational support to 500 marginalized children.



LIVELIHOOD PROGRAM:

Existing artisan network/willingness to work with more women artisans: Promotion of women entrepreneurs needs a multi branched approach. Women should be motivated to come out of their conventional profession for accepting more challenging and satisfying activities. Concurrently an environment should be equipped to facilitate their participation. Banks and other financial institutions must provide credit linkage facilities to women entrepreneurs on both priority basis and concessional terms. The problems of women in financial field have acknowledged great attention of international bodies in contemporary era. Several institutional arrangements have been made to protect and develop women entrepreneurship. Though there has been a constructive growth in women entrepreneurship, more & more support and engagement needs to be provided to them. This would certainly improve their socio-economic status which is arequirement for economic development. It is clear that DSWS is playing important and multi-dimensional role in promoting Self-HelpGroups, women empowerment and also general rural development activities. It is eminent that socio-economic empowerment is made with the help of Self-Help Groups, Cooperative societies, Producer Company etc. Further, Self-Help Groups have formed for the empowerment of women and as such, by their active involvement in Self-Help Group activities, the women are receiving economic benefits, thereby even getting social status also. Rural women have formed Self-Help Groups those are promoted by DSWS. The Self-Help Groups have given women an economic identification, economic freedom, ways of income generation, etc. Quite a lot of women are becoming entrepreneurs particularly in the middleclass women due to realization of economic benefits. Presently, the women entrepreneurs prefer a profession as a challenge as an independent urge to do something innovative and have a livelihood occupation. But the fact remains that there are fewer women business entrepreneurs, struggling to set up and run their industries. The task therefore is to develop a system for bringing more women into the entrepreneurial area and provide them organized support.



Existing Network with public and private bodies in their Region

DSWS is one of the members in various committees in Block, District and State level of Govt. of West Bengal. DSWS is also one of the training partner of Paschim Banga Society for Skill Development (PBSSD) and DDGKY and West Bengal Swarojgar Corporation Limited.

DSWS has the advantage of a strong community level presence in working areafrom 1994 and enjoy a good rapport with the parents, local government, teachers, youth, women artisans and children there.

At the same time **DSWS** has strong networks with the administrative departments at all levels (Village level, GP level, Block level, District level and State level) and also strong networks with the 46 women SHGs who are involve in our existing production/Training centre. 258 women artisans got agriculture training. They established mangrove nursey and they planted 12 lakhs mangrove plants in river embankment of Sundarban. They are selling their products (plants) from nursery to Governments and NGOs.

DSWS has strong network with local government, PRIs, Govt. departments like District Administration viz. District Rural Development Cell, District Industries Centre, Department of Women & Child Development and Social Welfare, Regional Director, Eastern Regional Office, O/o Development Commissioner (Handicrafts), Kolkata, PBSSD, MSME Department ,Private sector like Bandhan Creations, NABARD, State Bank of India etc. for livelihood generation programmes. In addition to that local youth clubs, Mahila Mandals / Samity are also associated with DSWS. Regular contacts with new buyers are gradually increasing.

Products and Production Capabilities

Production Capabilities:

Production capacity is Rs.5 lakhs to 15 lakh per quarter on an average. It varies depending on volume oforders received. There are 106 women artisans working regularly in production throughout the year and other artisans are involved as per volume of orders. Handicraft products have been supplying to the regular institutional buyers like Fab-India, Sasha Exports, Tantuja, etc. as per their monthly requirement.

Marketing Capabilities:

Potential Marketing Networks:

DSWS hasone big team who are trying to marketing and who are trying to establish strong relationship with domestic and international marketing channels and network.

We have good relationship with Fair-Trade marketing organizations like **SASHA** and other marketing organizations like Bandhan Creations, Khadi udyog, Fab India, etc. Now women artisans are linked with Fair-Trade marketing organizations.

Domestic Market

The Linkages in the Current Market Scenario are indicated below Wholesalers / Traders:

Our woman artisans are directly contacting with local retailer/wholesalers and selling them.

- *Fairs/ Exhibitions:* Individual artisans have big opportunities to sale their craft produces (especially excess stock of orders executed) in various handicraft fairs and exhibitions organized by Govt. and Non-Govt. agencies throughout the year to the retail customers. This buyer seller meet enables them to understand design trend and fashion trend in the market.
- Retailers: Tantuja, SASHA are such large retailers having nationwide stores selling most of the product categories, sourced from various craft producer groups, entrepreneurs and traders involved in the handicraft trade.
- *Institutional Buyers:* These are the various non-profitable organizations and institutions involved in the sector selling through their retail outlets, E marketing and various other networks, sourcing from the artisans associated with them.

A total of 87 prospective youth were screened to select member for Puffed Rice and Nursery trades. And, 38 youths in the age group of 18 24 years were selected based on the criteria of the trades. For Puffed rice centres and Nursery Centres, the selected number of youth is 20 & 18 respectively. President, Secretary & Treasurer have been selected for all the four groups. Both the trades are fully operational. They have also been oriented on Income Tracking, Profit Calculation and Expenditure Tracking.



WASH PROGRAM:

Swachh Bharat Mission aims to make India an open defecation free country in 5 years. IHHL Application is a massive program for constructing private toilets in urban and rural areas. Construction of individual household toilets is going on rapidly in 4401 towns and several rural areas of <u>India</u>. Under <u>IHHL scheme</u>, Central and State governments are providing financial assistance in the construction of household toilets.

We got a support from Panchayat and Rural Development Department (Govt. of West Bengal) for Construction of individual household toilets for 500 poor families in Sarberia Agarhati Gram Panchayat of Sandeshkhali Block-I under North 24 Parganas district. We completed successfully this program. We conducted many sensitization program on WASH in Sandeshkhali Block-I.









Mangrove Plantation in Sunderbans, West Bengal

(Dignity for Work program, Supported by Goonj, West Bengal)

Mangroves are a salt-tolerant group of tropical plants that occupy the inter-tidal zones of the sheltered coasts. They adapted various unfavorable environmental conditions to growth with salt water, unstable soils due to tidal flow and lack of freshwater.

Mangroves with their characteristic root system are capable of reducing erosive forces of waves, tidal currents and consolidating sediment, thus check erosion. Mangroves are capable of preventing the water current and waves and works as a coastal defense function. Mangroves serve the function of wind breakers in the Sunderbans area and saves villages from being blowing away. Mangroves are the habitat of most of the fish and shellfish in the coastal waters.

Mangrove Plantation:

Plantation of mangrove saplings in the alongside river coast is intended to regenerate the depleted mangrove in Atapur area. As per the plan, the regeneration work covered in Atapur area.

<u>Training on Raising Mangrove Nursery:</u>

The SHGs in Mithakhali, Monipur, Atapur, Purba Atapur will work in raising the mangrove samplings for the plantation work. All the SHGs in these villages were identified. We required to contract with 03 SHGs to raise 01 lakhs of mangrove saplings. They are the leading stakeholder in raising the saplings and protecting the plantation plots. We selected 03 SHGs from the enlisted SHGs as per the given below criteria:

- * Have prior experience of raising mangrove nurseries or familiar with the work
- Have bank account and other books of records updated
- * Agree to protect the mangrove sites at least three years after the plantation
- * The SHG must be constituted with female members
- * Priority will be given to the vulnerable women groups
- * The SHGs which members are residing beside the rivers must be prioritized

These SHGs were trained on how to raise mangrove saplings. It was a two days training.

Leaders and members of 03 SHGs participated at this training. On the first day of the training the theoretical part of the raising mangrove nursery raising was discussed. On the second day of the training, practical exercise was conducted. This process of preparing nursery has positive aspect from different aspects. This will empower the women economically, socially and politically. This will increase the participation and ownership of women and community people in the work and sustaining the work for a long time. This is also very cost-effective for the project by cutting many cost of bringing saplings from outside the village.

Raising Mangrove Saplings (DFW Program):

After the training, we provided nursery bag and organic manure to the SHGs. They started preparing the soil for the nursery, the nursery bed, and filled up the nursery bag with soil. Simultaneously, they started collecting mangrove seed from the river. The seed was then planted in the filled up bags. Within one months of the seeding, the saplings grew upto 1 feet. It was then shifted on the river bank. At the nursery bed the saplings are raising with sweet water. After shifting the saplings on river bed, it gets drown by saline water during high tide of the day. This helps the saplings to get habituated to grow in saline water. After that it is being planted on the river bed (saline water). If directly (from nursery bed) planted on the river bed (saline water) it will die. The saplings were kept at the river bank for two months.

Mangrove nursery and Planting Mangroves

Involvement of Community and Selection of the Vulnerable Sites:

In the mean time, community mobilization activities were conducted. We conducted village meetings, Cultural Program to make the people aware about the importance of mangrove to protect their villages. The villagers agreed to take off the work of mangrove plantation in their villages. The villagers suggested the plots available in their village for plantation. We involved consultant for selection of the mangrove plantation plots. The technical aspects of the plots were checked by the consultant. The plots were finalized with the consent of the villagers.

DFW and **Plantation**:

The plantation conducted through dry food package for 01 month. This helped people to get immediate livelihood opportunity and check migration. On the other hand, this will protect the village from future disaster through creation of community resource (mangrove forest). HMG level meetings were conducted for identification of the beneficiaries under DFW program. The beneficiaries (under DFW) for mangrove plantation were finalized in the meeting of Village Disaster Management Committee. After the selection of the beneficiaries, the construction of bamboo guard wall (in the required places), pit digging and plantation was conducted by the beneficiaries. The pits dug on the alongside of the river were filled up with silt (*Pali*) within

one month of the digging the pit. The saplings were then carried out at the plantation sites and it was planted in the filled up pits.





Managerial and financial capacity

The organization has wide experience in effective management and expertise to implement the project on health, women and child welfare, livelihood, disaster management, skill training program, designdevelopment program, EDP training etc. It has also sound financial capacity to handle the International agencies, govt. projects and good linkages with Govt. departments like MSME, PBSSD, DDGKY, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Department of Women & Child Development and Social Welfare, Govt. of West Bengal, State Bank of India etc.

Humanitarian response for "Covid 19"

Supported By-Azim Premji foundation

We received the application of humanitarian response from various corner of North and South 24parganas. As per their prayer we have completed the need assessment. At the beginning of the need assessment we select some criteria for this selection like women and protection, Water and Nutrition security, Health and sanitation, Shelter and Food etc.





After the assessment we select the vulnerable pockets for response as per our level best. Then we discussed to our volunteers to rostering the list of most vulnerability affected people with discussion from

Gram Panchayet and community people. Then they started to list the vulnerable community from every hamlets of every effected pocket.

Geographical coverage:-

We have covered 20 Villages of Sandeshkhali I & Sandeshkhali II Community Development Blocks which is located district of North 24 parganas. Total 2000 families have benefited by this relief support. We have completed the Distribution processes as per the planning.

Targeted Group:-

In Sandeshkhali area, we have reached out to the mostly vulnerable and marginalized families in 2000 HHs in 20 villages. DSWS has been applied the following vulnerability selection criteria among the prioritized populations: Women/single men-headed household with children, Child-headed household, Pregnant and lactating women, Families with the most number of children, Families reeling under extreme poverty/loss, Families with members with disability.

Operational details:-

We have distributed 2000 households for enhance the participants of the distribution processes. We have successfully sensitized to community people for maintaining and always avoid the hug gathering in distribution time. Beneficiaries have maintained the social distancing and avoid the hug gathering in distribution time. We have also coordinated with Community people as well as improvement of engagement of adolescent girls, school teachers, Students, youth leaders, SHGs & PRI functionaries on enhanced to distribution processes.

Challenges:- Any major challenges have not arisen in this program but we have not covered the all affected households due to limitation of distributed materials.

Outcomes: Encouraged to participants especiallywomen, Children & special needs people who is Mostly vulnerable for enhance their livelihood situation as well as 15 days meal supports.

Engagement of PRI functionaries.

In connection of the distribution processes enhanced to both away from Community people and Panchayet Raj Institution functionaries like as Member of Legislation, Gram Panchayet prodhans, Panchayet Members, Youth leaders, School teacher, Students and members of Self Help Groups (SHG). PRI functionaries are encouraged to Community peoples to marinating the Social distances and hand washing properly against Covid 19. Gram Panchayet are trying to address the present situation and come back their previous situation.
